



#### With love from the Vicar . . .

This week I managed to catch up on the latest Tom Hanks film *Greyhound*. The film is based on the 1955 novel *The Good Shepherd* by C.S. Forester and depicts experiences from the Battle of the Atlantic in early 1942. Tom Hanks plays a US Navy Commander on his first assignment crossing the Atlantic as part of a multi-national escort group defending a merchant ship convoy carrying vital



supplies. The task is to get the 37 Allied ships safely across the Atlantic to Liverpool, but the convoy comes under severe attack from a 'wolfpack' of German submarines. Over the course of three days, just when the Greyhound's crew think they've overcome one onslaught, another begins. The running thread of humour through the film is that every time the kitchen bring food for the Captain to eat, he's thrown into a new crisis. He does indeed though prove to be a 'Good Shepherd' and, though there are sad losses along the way, he does an astounding job of assuring, not only his own crew's safety, but that of the convoy as a whole.

In what had felt a somewhat 'full on' week for me, the film helped to bring things into perspective. It reminded me of a verse from the Bible, We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair (2 Corinthians 4: 8). Someone was describing the constant adaptations Coronavirus is requiring of us as being not just the equivalent of a marathon, but more like a triathlon or an Iron Man! I spoke to one funeral director who told me they had done the equivalent of 10 months' work in 3. Some of us may also be feeling like that. Others may be struggling more with the enforced inactivity the crisis has imposed on us. Whatever our experience, I do hope this summer period, with the easing of many of the restrictions we have lived with over the last 3 months, will provide some opportunity for you to have a break, a holiday (even if it's at home) and long awaited reunions with family and friends!

The summer brings a special highlight for us at St Giles in that we are opening our doors again for public worship in our building! We are starting small and starting safe, with a 10.30 am service each Sunday. To maintain safe social distancing, we will be limited to 20 places in the church so we have decided to operate a Booking System. Please phone or email me if you would like to book a place. A Guidance Letter with more detailed information has been sent out in the post and you can also find it on our website. We do look forward to seeing you whenever you feel ready to join us again!

When writing for the April magazine I asked the question, "Where has your journey through Lent taken you?" and I made the comment, "...our journey has taken a very different turn with the current events and social isolation that have been thrust upon us. Our journey continues but in a very different direction. It is a journey of contrasts; highs and lows, conflicting emotions, anxieties and questions."

And as we continue our journeys we certainly have experienced many high and lows and conflicting emotions. On the one hand we have almost drowned in a tsunami of grief, desolation and helplessness and on the other we have seen positives never dreamed of; a cleaner environment that has been beneficial to wildlife and flora, families having quality time together, an overwhelming gratitude for the blessings we have and time and space to nurture our personal faith, among the few.

This month I thought I'd share some snippets of our experiences during lockdown. Like many we have counted our blessings for the garden and the sunshine. We even had a visitor!

And what a lot we can learn from God's creation. I'd like to share with you a post that Andrew, my son put on Facebook. A modern day parable if you like.



"God, animals are so dumb right? I mean they aren't intelligent like humans are they? I mean why don't all the bigger stronger birds bully the smaller birds and take all the food for themselves so the smaller birds starve to death even



though there is plenty for everyone? I mean why don't the yellow birds attack the mouse because he is different? Why are they just sharing? It's almost like they are celebrating the extra struggle he has had to face to receive the same rewards as them ... I mean how crazy is that? I'll tell you why— because being a bully makes you the lowest of the low ... and racism, well there's a special place

in Hell for those that judge based on colour or race... They say humans are the most intelligent species on the planet ... yes we are technologically more advanced but I really don't think that makes us the smartest creatures on the planet. Celebrate your differences and enjoy the beauty this world has to offer."

Even as members of the church we have many differences to celebrate and each of us has, I'm sure, thought about the best way to personally be true to our faith and ourselves during this lockdown. We may be physically apart but as a community we have still been able to prayerfully support one another as we journey through this together. We may be isolated but we are not alone. In this space we have been given we still have the opportunity to worship and adore our Saviour, remembering, "Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever," and He says "Do not be afraid," "I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

I pray that you have been able to find a Jesus centred space where love resides; a kind, gentle and compassionate place where you feel at home and at peace. A place where you hear the words, "Be still and know that I am God." Last week I heard this song on the television and it touched my heart, so I will close with these words for you to ponder upon too.

When Love came down to earth
And made His home with us,
The hopeless found a hope,
The sinner found a friend.
Not to the powerful
But to the poor He came,
And humble, hungry hearts
Were satisfied again.

Come lay your heavy load Down at the Master's feet; Your shame will be removed, Your joy will be complete. Come crucify your pride, And enter as a child; For those who bow down low He'll lift up to His side.

#### An update from the Green Genies and Meadow Group

As many of you will know the Green Genies group has coordinated the maintenance work in our church yard for many years. The group meets several times a year to carry out essential tasks such as planting out the Begonias along the church path. In between those working party events the group undertakes regular tidying and management jobs like watering, weeding and deadheading.

More recently the PCC set up a small group to look at the management of St Giles Meadow. Under the direction of Rev Gail this group has already taken steps to improve the information provided to families whose loved ones are buried in the Meadow and has ordered noticeboards that will give clear information about the ways in which we hope to maintain it as a haven for nature.

These two groups have now come together to compile an annual calendar that will set out the jobs that need to be done in both the churchyard and the meadow as each month goes by. Over the years it has been wonderful to have so many people volunteer to help look after our beautiful surroundings. We have recently received many positive comments about how lovely the churchyard is looking and how attractive the wild flowers are in the meadow. Even in these times of social distancing we managed to plant out the Begonias and we can all now enjoy the result of our work!

The group would encourage anyone interested in helping in this work to get in touch. Working party events will be publicised but if you feel that you can do some tidying independently, please contact the group first so that they are aware of your intentions and can tell you what jobs are a priority. Like a lot of the work that goes on behind the scenes in our church family, much has always been done in our outside environment quietly and without recognition. #### LOCALLY AND NATIONALLY

#### WORLDWIDE

This is just an example of the work MU Members are carrying out. Tanzanians are having a difficult time at present due to ongoing challenges presented by COVID-19. People are suffering from the disease in multiple dimensions financially, physically, mentally, and spiritually.

The Mothers' Union team on the ground in Tanzania analysed that there was a significant knowledge gap. People in general do not have enough information and are not aware of the dangers posed by the disease. This is especially the case in villages and among people who fall into vulnerable categories. This includes impoverished people, the elderly, orphans, and street children. After delivering training to established communities, they are looking forward to taking action to reach vulnerable people in a specific village. This place is known as Sukamahela village in the Diocese of Rift Valley where people with leprosy are living. The plan is to raise awareness and provide soap, buckets, masks, sanitizers, food, information posters and brochures.

#### THY KINGDOM COME

The planned event to be held at Coventry Cathedral on 22<sup>nd</sup> May was cancelled due to COVID 19. However, this was replaced by a virtual service on the same day at the same time. Those who were able to watch this were delighted that Margaret Siggers, one of our Trustees read a passage from the Bible during the Service. It was wonderful to watch live and to see comments being posted from hundreds of members around the world.

## Sylvia Williamson Passed away on 14 June, aged 86 years

Sylvia was the only child of William and Mary Sanderson. She was born on a farm in the Lake District but, very sadly, her father died just a month before she was born, meaning the family soon had to move to live with her Gran and three cousins in Annon, a town in the Scottish Borders. At 18 months old, Sylvia and her mum moved again to Ecclefechan, just off the M74. Her mum, Margaret remarried and Sylvia enjoyed attending the local village school. It was here that she developed a love of writing, something she continued right up to the end of her life, becoming a prolific letter writer – just one of the many things she will always be remembered for.

Sylvia's first job was as a pastry chef for Mr & Mrs Currie in Lockerbie. Sylvia proved to be an extremely talented chef. She was a passionate cake maker – famous for her cream horns and lemon drizzle to name but two. Sylvia loved making cakes for both birthdays and weddings and would always offer these as 'a present from the Williamson family'. She was skilled at sugarcraft with her icing becoming a work of art. Sylvia was so generous in her willingness to bake that it was not difficult for John to arrange a playful radio prank specially for her. With the help of a DJ, they managed to get her all too readily to sign up to make a 7 tier wedding cake for a friend, with every tier to be a different colour of the rainbow. Having such a generous heart and an excellent sense of humour herself, Sylvia was willing to go along with it and very much enjoyed the joke.

In her younger years, Sylvia loved dancing and enjoyed getting dolled up in her glad rags to attend the local dances. It was here that she met the one true love of her life, Fred. They married when Sylvia was 21 and enjoyed over 40 years of happily married life. In 1958, Fred and Sylvia had their first son Roy. In 1961 they moved to Coventry where Fred set up his own business as a builder. It was in 1963 that they moved to what would become their lifelong home on the new caravan site on Broad Lane in Ash Green and just two years later the family grew with John's arrival.

Sylvia was an accomplished home maker, keeping the caravan and the garden in tip top condition. She liked things so spic and span that she would even climb on top of the caravan roof to clean it! To earn a little pocket money, Sylvia worked as a cleaner at both the Ash Green Club and the Royal Oak. She was a very active member of the Methodist Church on Wheelwright Lane and would always be baking for charity events and coffee mornings. Saturday would usually be Sylvia's baking day, but everything had to be finished and packed away by 4 pm to make way for her other great enthusiasm — the wrestling!

Sylvia leaves behind her a very lasting and rich legacy of love for her family and all who knew her. With such a big heart, she would be the first to help anybody and was a friend for life. Her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren and the extended

family that came through them were her pride and joy. Her friends Sylvia, Barbara and Diane became lifelong friends and she liked nothing better than a cup of tea and a chat with them. With her kind, caring and selfless nature, Sylvia gave her all to everything she did with so much love and that legacy is sure to live on in everyone's hearts well beyond the years of her life with us here.

#### Passed away on 15 June, aged 91 years

#### The family share some memories of Mum, Nanna and Great-Nanna ...

Coral's daughters Tina, Gillian and Louise remember their mum making clothes and dance costumes for them as they were growing up, even making Louise a bikini out of terry towelling—with tassels—that wasn't quite so good when wet! On holidays, mum would always be there ready with towel on hand to warm the girls up as they emerged from the chilly North Sea — she even made a special changing towel. French cricket (excuse the pun) on the beach was a favourite family game.

Coral brought the girls a cup of tea and a biscuit in bed every school day morning – imagine that! They suspect it offered her a few moments' peace before they all descended. She proved that house cleaning could be entertaining. She would sit the children on a sheet and drag them up and down the hall to polish the floor—great fun!

No-one can beat your mum's Sunday roast and Coral's Sunday dinners were no exception. They tasted even better once you had left home and Coral whistled and tap danced in the kitchen to the radio as she cooked. She was a good dancer and Louise still remembers Coral dancing the jive with Dad at her wedding as well as at other parties she attended.

Coral performed in the St Giles panto a couple of times. Her most notable performance was the wicked witch in Sleeping Beauty. She played the part so convincingly that on her first entrance a small child ran screaming from the hall – something which the family never let her live down! She also appeared in Townswomen's Guild plays which were entered into the Guild's regional competitions.

Coral was not always technically minded. When Gillian's car broke down, everyone was scratching their heads and peering at the engine. Coral suggested that the car might perhaps work better if the bonnet were down.

Coral was very particular about her appearance. She liked to be smartly turned out, ensuring outfits matched well. This continued throughout her life, even when she moved into Richmond Lodge. On her 90th birthday, she asked for a new lipstick and always enjoyed having her hair and nails done. Coral's family are deeply thankful to all the staff at Richmond Lodge who cared for her so attentively throughout her time there and particularly over the last few months when family members were sadly unable to visit. Prior to moving into residential care, Coral had really good neighbours in Sandra and Dave. She will be fondly remembered by so many friends and neighbours in Deansway and Canon Drive, as well as members of the Townswomen's Guild which was still active until the end of last year. Special mention must also be given to Coral's very close friend Margaret who, though unable to see Coral prior to lockdown due to her own ill health, enjoyed many years of longstanding friendship with Coral.

Coral coped extremely well when her husband, Roy, was working abroad, even when she contracted chicken pox during his absence. She was quite poorly with it and then shared it with all her children! Coral was able to join Roy for one of his trips to Singapore and, though initially anxious about going, enjoyed a month long stay there, although disappointed to miss Louise's 18th birthday (as was Louise).

In later years, when Coral needed a bit more help, the girls used to take her shopping. She always enjoyed going to the pub for dinner on the way back. Getting Coral's favourite tipple at pubs was always something of a challenge. She liked a gin and pep, but sadly no pub in the UK ever kept a stock of peppermint cordial. Her other favourite, Pernod and lemonade, was also hard to come by. Not to be defeated, the family did find a suitable alternative though. Coral may have been the only lady in her 80s drinking Sambuca in the bar, but it was certainly something that made all the family laugh.

Coral was thrilled to bits when her family extended to 6 grandchildren—Rachel, Helen, Andrew, Matthew, Connor and Nathan, and three great grandchildren.

Coral was never too convinced about Nathan's steering skills when he pushed her around the care home in her wheelchair. She panicked if Nathan went within 10 metres of the fish pond, thinking she would end up going for a swim! She did, however, enjoy watching her great-grandchildren feed rice crispies to the fish.

Connor loved the opportunity to have lunch at Nanna's. Coral liked nothing better than to feed people up and if you said no to something she offered, she would simply keep going through a vast list of options until you had to give in and have something.

All Coral's grandchildren remember her always being there for a hug, the full biscuit barrel and dish of sweets — all they needed to do was ask which they certainly did! Andrew and Matthew remember Nanna getting toys for them out of the dining room or shed and playing Jumping Frogs. Rachel remembers sleeping over on a Friday, then on Saturday morning a cooked breakfast, with pancakes made by granddad and a jig and singalong to the radio. Helen remembers all the cuddles, kisses, the chats (as well as the tellings-off), sharing mints and generally being spoiled by her lovely Nanna.

These memories, and so many more I'm sure, are testimony to the rich legacy of love Coral leaves behind her for every generation of her family and others who knew her. To sum it up, the family would like to say. "Thanks for the memories – mum, nanna and great-nanna. We'll all miss you loads but know that you're at peace with no more anxiety or pain. Night night, love you."

## Brenda Gibbs Passed away on 18 June, aged 80 years

#### Passed away on 29th June, aged 77 years

Vince was born at Stratford upon Avon, a fact that he was very proud of. He would joke that there was a brass plaque outside where he was born, failing to mention that the plaque actually read "Council Offices".

He attended the newly opened Woodlands School in Coventry, later becoming an apprentice at Morris Engines in Courthouse Green. It was this work that gave him a life

long interest in and love of cars. He was actually sorry when modern complexities meant he could no longer service his own car and until his later years could turn his hand to almost any practical task.

Joyce and Vince met through a mutual interest in photography and their first date was at a rugby club dance to give a member emigrating to Australia a good send off. In true rugby club fashion the guest of honour had his trousers removed and thrown out of a window. This did not endear Vince to Joyce's father when he heard about it but Vince was determined and he married Joyce on 25th March 1966 in St. Giles Church. They never moved far from the area, living first in Sapcote and then Cheylesmore, before returning to Ash Green, where they lived in the house they renovated together.

In his twenties Vince took his engineering skills to Rolls Royce Aerospace. He became a world renowned expert in borescope technology, which he helped develop in order to solve problems with jet engines, including those of Concord. This led to him travelling to many parts of the world, including Canada, U.S.A., Germany and Japan. He also worked on a warship in the North Sea.

In his retirement Vince was able to participate more in another of his interests, local history. He was a committee member of the Bedworth Society and worked for 20 years as a Steward at the Heritage Centre in Bedworth, helping visitors and answering questions about the exhibitions. He was also a Governor of All Saints School, Bedworth for many years. He helped set up North Warwickshire Tourism and was their Publicity Officer, speaking on the radio many times, an activity which he thoroughly enjoyed. He continued this voluntary work until his health deteriorated a couple of years ago.

Vince and a small group of other local people were responsible for the erection of a memorial to the miners who lost their lives in the Exhall Pit Disaster (and how fitting that his own final resting place should be so close to that memorial). He did a lot of research and was able to give relations of the miners information about their loved ones. Until his death Vince was Deputy Chairman of the Almshouses in Bedworth. In February this year Vince helped to arrange the visit of Prince Charles. This was a great honour to him and gave him a much needed boost at the point when his various illnesses had begun to seriously impact his daily life. Even then he was still finding plenty to laugh about. He told how he was introduced to Prince Charles about four times during the visit, shaking his hand each time. Prince Charles found this equally amusing and they shared a smile about it together.

Vince was a incredibly friendly person who was genuinely interested in others. He would talk with anyone and even total strangers felt comfortable chatting with him. That was probably what made him a natural at TV and radio appearances, although he constantly underestimated his own abilities. For many years he helped to promote Northern Warwickshire, an area which he loved deeply and of which he was very proud. He was equally passionate about all his voluntary work. When Vince took something on he was totally committed and always did his best, even when things were challenging.

Although he could be quite irreverent - many people variously enjoyed or endured his sense of humour - Vince was actually very insightful and thoughtful, especially when it

came to helping those in need. In 2010 his daughter Samantha lost her partner of 25 years to heart disease. She was also left with many practical problems to sort out, which took almost six years. By 2012 Vince felt that Sam needed something to help her start smiling again and distract her from all the bad things he couldn't fix - although he would if he could have. So, when he discovered that a friend had a litter of Labrador puppies and one was available, he asked Sam if he could give her a puppy. Sam thought about this for approximately 10 seconds and said "yes please!". The puppy, who she named Ivan, which means Gracious Gift, brought much needed joy back into Sam's life. This instinct for what could help someone in pain was typical of Vince.

Vince was great-hearted, funny and compassionate. A true gentleman, he lived for others and would do anything to help. He was an utterly devoted husband and father and the gap his absence leaves can never be filled.
