

At the moment we will not be restarting Playgroup in person as we feel it is important to keep the risk as low as we possibly can. Hopefully when things start to improve we can look at returning to our hall as we miss everyone terribly!

We have absolutely loved having some children back into church during the past few weeks and we feel confident about being able to provide the children with activities within the 10.30am service, so please do book a space with your children if you feel ready to come back. We would love to see you there.

We are very excited to let you know that we have plans for a new All Age Family Service called 'Happy Hearts and Minds'! We will be bringing this All Age Family Service to our Main Hall once a month on a Sunday afternoon. There will be a similar booking system to our 10.30am church service each week and we are excited to be able to welcome families into the hall to take part in some worship (although we can't all sing just yet!), maybe some crafts

and some family challenges. Each family will be seated around their own table, safely distanced from everyone else and each table will have its own resources so we hope it's somewhere that you can feel really confident about coming to! Our first Happy Hearts and Minds Service will be on **Sunday 25th October at 2pm** and we would LOVE to see you there. The coming months are usually a hugely busy time for Children's and Families' work at St Giles' and we are hoping that this year will be as busy as usual only in new and interesting ways! **Harvest** is upon us and this time last year Rev Gail and I visited the local schools to speak to them in assemblies all about Harvest and why we should be thankful. This year as we are currently not able to be in school with the students for assemblies, we decided to take it to a virtual level! We recorded our very own assembly in the church building and have sent it out to the schools, so we should be appearing in most children's classrooms across the parish around the Harvest period. We are so pleased that there are still ways to 'be with' the students and to bring them messages from the church! We are hoping to record more assemblies looking at topics such as Remembrance and Advent.

We will be continuing with our online **Family Church at Home** resources on a Sunday and we do hope you are finding some time to use some or all of the sheets! Our **Messy Church at Home** posts will continue on a Sunday afternoon too, and we will be using some of these activities during our services too.

I really hope that you are finding some positives in this highly unusual time and as we take time this month to consider Harvest, as well as being hugely

thankful for our farmers, I hope that we can spend some time thinking about all that God is still doing around us. I am praying that you are all finding some calm amongst the chaos and that you feel God with you every step on this journey!

Nature Notes

These nature notes are dedicated to the memory of the late
Mr Norman Edmonds, Local Historian, Naturalist and well respected Ash Green
School Master. Mr Edmonds wrote a page in the Church Magazine for
30 years, and I humbly try to follow in his footsteps.

The swallows and swifts have been gone a few weeks now, and the last to fly off are the house martins – hope they make it back next year. I was watching a

cloud of gnats flying up and down (like they do) in the late sunshine, when suddenly an Emperor Dragonfly was seen trying to catch them for supper. The gnats soon scattered diving for cover. Just last week a chiffchaff was heard calling. Most of them migrate south, but with warmer winters may be they will decide to stay.



Four more bird stories:

- Loften hear the resident tawny owl. I can now say I have seen him, my night camera caught him on the ground after a mouse.
- The cock pheasant has been here all the year, but the females go off during the breeding season, returning to the feeders in the autumn. After lunch, I was having a short nap when a tapping noise woke me up, and there was the first female pheasant returning, and pecking on the patio window it was probably because she could see her reflection In the window. Nevertheless very welcome.
- On a hot day my son's patio doors were wide open, and at great speed in flew a sparrowhawk chasing a bird. He hit the back wall and fell down the back of the settee followed by great panic in the household. A towel was thrown over him and eventually he was put back outside. He won't forget that for while.
- I was given a colourful wrought iron kingfisher on a stick as a present. Where shall I put it? I decided to put in the flower border looking into the bird bath but after two weeks I had to move it as not one bird would come to drink at the bird bath they obviously didn't like the look of this big kingfisher!

Maybe with more time to spare – try bird watching.

The Carter Summer Cruise



This was to be our main summer outing on our narrowboat, Chyandour. (Chyandour is Cornish 'house on the water'.) Our aim was to go to Lincoln which involves travelling on several canals and the River Trent. We tried to get there last autumn. but you may remember that the end of September last year was

very, very wet, the Trent flooded and we gave up!

We started at Wyken Basin, Alderman's Green, where we moor our boat, then to Fradley, Shardlow, Fradley (again), Great Haywood, Stourton, Stourbridge, Birmingham, Fazeley, and home. You may notice that this list does not include Lincoln. This is because Storm Dennis caused chaos across the country. We were held up near Burton-on-Trent because of a tree brought down by the wind while workmen cleared a pathway. And the water levels were rising; the Environment Agency closed a flood lock on the Trent which would prevent us travelling through. We decided to turn round and go back as far as Fradley and then go west instead of east!

Here are some of the highs and lows of our trip.

We travelled sections of many canals: Oxford, Coventry, Trent & Mersey, Staffs & Worcs, Stourbridge, Dudley No.1, Dudley No.2, Birmingham & Fazeley.

We did 162 locks and travelled almost 200 miles. One day we did 24 locks, and on another, 27. We slept well after doing all those! Some of the locks on the Trent & Mersey are broad rather than narrow. Narrow locks are wide enough for one boat at a time, broad locks are wide enough for two. Because broad locks are bigger, they can be very hard work! Fortunately, only 12 of the 162 were broad.





En route we passed through three places where we have lived and worked: Castlecroft near Wolverhampton, Netherton near Dudley and Smethwick.

Entertainment was provided at one lock, where a dog refused to get back on her boat. Her owner moored up

and came back to collect her, but she evaded him for some time before he was able to catch her.

During our cruise, we were able to see several friends who live next to or very close to a canal. We were even able to have coffee with them — socially distanced of course. We belong to Boaters' Christian Fellowship, and we always look out for boats displaying the BCF stickers in their windows. While it may not be possible to stop and talk to everyone, we manage to exchange greetings, or at least, to wave as we pass each other.

Usually when we are boating, we eat out a couple of times a week (we like to support local businesses!), but this trip, we only had two meals out. One was for our wedding anniversary at The Bridge Inn, Branston, a pub which does excellent Italian food. The other was a cooked breakfast at the Willows Tearoom in Mercia Marina near Derby. We also had two takeaways, an Indian meal from Cellars in Stourbridge and fish and chips in Fazeley, both very good.

We booked a visitor's slot online at Shugborough, so we moored at the closest point (the ancient Essex Bridge). We had coffee and cake in their tea-room and then enjoyed a walk around the grounds. We also acquired some vegetables for a donation to NT funds; their restaurant is not fully open so they've got a surplus of veg. On other days, we found free food – damsons collected on a walk and mushrooms picked on the towpath.

Having had torrential rain and gales, we ended the trip in unseasonably hot sunshine.

It wasn't the cruise we had planned, but it had been a good one.



Arrangements for Remembrance Sunday 2020

Sadly, due to Covid 19 restrictions, it will not be possible for our local community to gather at the War Memorial this year. However, we have been keen to find an alternative way to mark this special day and to commemorate those from Exhall and Ash Green who gave their lives in war. We



have decided to mark the event indoors rather than outdoors this year.

On Sunday November 8th our 10.30 am service will focus on Remembrance. This service will incorporate all the elements of remembrance we would usually observe, including the 2-minute silence at 11.00am. Wreaths will also be presented for a blessing. To maintain safe social distancing, places in the church building are limited to 20. Anyone wishing to attend the Remembrance Service in church that morning will need to book a place in line with our current Covid-secure arrangements. This can be done by phone or email by contacting the Parish Office or our Vicar using the information given below.

The occasion will also be live streamed via Facebook Live on the St Giles, Exhall Facebook Page to allow people to join in from home as well. From Sunday Nov 1st there will be two wreath rings available in the churchyard so that members of the community can add a poppy if they wish (please maintain safe social distancing on visiting the churchyard). One ring will be on the bench by the church door and the second will be in the Garden of Rest at the bottom of the church drive, near the lychgate. By Sunday 8th we hope these wreaths will be full of poppies and a valuable representation of the local community's gratitude to those who gave their lives for our freedom. They will be placed alongside the other wreaths at the war memorial after the service on Nov 8th.

So, in summary, there will be NO gathering at the War Memorial and NO procession on Remembrance Sunday. For the safety of the community as a whole, we would value your cooperation in avoiding the temptation to congregate in that area on the day itself. Please note that the usual road closures will not be in place. We look forward to marking the occasion with the honour and dignity it deserves, albeit in a very different way this year and thank you for your support. Do remember to book a place to attend the service or watch on Facebook Live and do come along during the week to add your poppy to the community wreaths.

Sharon Neale, a much loved member of our St Giles family, went home to be with Jesus on 14th September. Her funeral took place at the Heart of England Crematorium on Wednesday 30th September.

Remembering Elizabeth Fry, prison reformer

Some people make the world a better place for hundreds of thousands of others.

The prison reformer and philanthropist Elizabeth Fry died 175 years ago, on 12th October 1845. She was widely admired during her lifetime and after, and was depicted on the British £5 note between 2001 and 2016.

She was born into the family of a wealthy Quaker banker, John Gurney, in Norwich in 1870. She rededicated her life to Christ at the age of 18 and devoted herself to helping the downtrodden. This she continued to do after her marriage to London merchant Joseph Fry, and while bringing up 11 children.

She was a minister of the Society of Friends from 1811 and travelled in England and Europe inspecting prisons and writing reports that were highly influential, transforming gaols from "pits of indecency and brutality" to more orderly places with a new interest in reform. She was admired by both Queen Victoria and Florence Nightingale.

Early on she made frequent visits to Newgate Prison in London, suggesting radical improvements that were adopted both there and in other prisons. She read the Bible to inmates and gave Bibles away, combining social work with proclamation of the Gospel in a way that inspired future generations. Her insights also led to the Prison Reform Act of 1823.
