




#### With love from the Vicar . . .

Autumn is often known as a Season of Remembrance. In the church calendar, Nov 1<sup>st</sup> marks All Saints' Day. This is an opportunity to remember and be thankful for men and women throughout history who have inspired us, whose lives have demonstrated the love and grace of God in many and varied ways. It's a season to focus on our belonging together as a human family, the



memories we treasure both collectively and individually, the gift we are to each other.

All Saints' Day is immediately followed by All Souls' Day – a Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. For many of us this may hold particular poignancy this year. Perhaps you have lost a loved one during a year in which Covid 19 has made the pain of bereavement and the process of grieving even more challenging and acute. Perhaps the increased sense of isolation and loneliness the lockdown months have imposed have caused us to miss those we love but see no longer more than ever. This season of remembrance offers us an opportunity to stand together in solidarity with all those who have lost loved ones, to support one another along the way in the journey of grief and, through the memories we share, to find new hope. To help us do this, we'll be opening St Giles on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> November from 4 – 6 pm for private prayer to provide some quiet space to remember loved ones. You'll find more details about this later on in this magazine.



Opportunities for collective remembrance are vital to the life of any community. This year our annual Act of Remembrance on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November to commemorate all those who have lost their lives in war will take place in a rather different way. Again, you'll find more detail further on in the magazine. Our ways of remembering may take a different shape with the safety precautions we are all needing to take at present, but the important thing is that we do still remember and that we use our remembering to make our world a more positive and peaceful place for all who live in it.

In addition to the opportunities St Giles is offering on Remembrance Sunday, you might like to stand out on your own doorstep at 11.00 am on that morning. You might like to create a poppy display in a window of your home. You might like to take note of one of the names mentioned on our local war memorial and see if you can find out a bit more about that person.

We can remember too that seasons of intense pressure, hardship and loss, such as were experienced through both World Wars and have been in conflicts since, can eventually come to an end through patient resilience. Our remembering can be a catalyst for us to rebuild and reshape our communities in ways which open up new opportunities for a wider range of people.

So, may God draw close to you in all your remembering. Please be in touch



with us if you would particularly value some bereavement support at this time, or if we can help in other ways through these more difficult winter months. Let's work together to ensure that nobody in our community has to feel alone.

We hope that some of the activities we're suggesting in this magazine will help to

generate a sense of solidarity and togetherness to lighten up our community throughout these darker days.

Keep your eye out for news of upcoming Christmas events. It might be different but we are still going to have a lot of fun celebrating Christmas together!


There is still lots going on in the life of St Giles Kids work! Thank you for your continued support. Please continue to pray for our families through this time, that they are safe, happy and healthy.

#### Prisons Week – A Week of Prayer in October

Christians have been encouraged to pray in October for all those in the criminal justice system – prisoners, victims, court staff, police and other law enforcers – so that they will know that they are accompanied in thought and prayer, even through this time of lockdowns.

Crime often creates strong emotions, be it fear, anxiety, regret, or anger to name a few. These emotions can consume the heart, and prayer is an outlet. Prayer offers comfort, even if you are not a believer.



#### **Angel Tree Gifts**

Prison. It's famous for being overcrowded. And yet the sense of isolation and loss can be unbearable.

Prisoners are parents, sons, daughters, sisters and brothers. They are human beings with families. Just like any one of us, they are created in the image and likeness of God. They, like us, have a huge capacity for love.

At some point during their lives, they have taken a wrong turn, gone down the wrong path, and ended up hurting someone, not least themselves. Often, they are struggling with their mental health. They are crying out for hope. By extension, that hurt often impacts on their families, causing devastation and grief among prisoners' children who wind up feeling the loss of losing a family member to months or years behind bars.

Children of prisoners are the hidden victims. They grow up without a parent, worrying about that loss, and with the heartache and shame of having to shoulder the consequences of a crime they are not responsible for.

That's where Angel Tree steps in to help families flourish. Angel Tree ensures that prisoners' children are remembered at Christmas, and do not lose out on the joy of feeling loved by their parent.

The prisoner fills out an application form, making the request for a present, and pens a note for their child. The presents are then bought by Angel Tree volunteers, gift wrapped, the handwritten note enclosed, and delivered to the families at Christmas each year.

Angel Tree means children all over the country do not miss out on the joy of receiving a Christmas present from their father or mother in prison.

# Annual Memorial Service Open for private prayer Sunday November 1<sup>st</sup> 2pm – 4pm

I'm sure it won't come as a surprise to you that this year's memorial service, which gives us an opportunity to come together to remember our loved ones, will look very different.

Due to Covid 19 restrictions we cannot have a service as such but we will be opening the church for private prayer and reflection between 2pm and 4pm on Sunday, November 1<sup>st</sup>.

While we can't join together as a whole church family we will be reading out the names of loved ones throughout that time so please do visit the church to fill in a remembrance card or light a candle.

We are not asking you to book a time slot in advance but we do ask you to bear in mind our current restrictions, which limit us to 20 people in the building at any one time. Seating areas in pews are clearly marked to help you keep your distance, hand sanitiser is available at the door and you will need to wear a mask (unless exempt).

Please try to limit your visit to 15-20 minutes to allow as many people as possible a time for private prayer. If you arrive and the church is looking full, please wait until a space becomes available.

We know this isn't ideal but we do feel it's important to offer a time of prayer and reflection within the church for this important event.

### **Nature Notes**

These nature notes are dedicated to the memory of the late
Mr Norman Edmonds, Local Historian, Naturalist and well respected Ash Green
School Master. Mr Edmonds wrote a page in the Church Magazine for
30 years, and I humbly try to follow in his footsteps.

Early in November on the  $11^{th}$  it's Martinmas, and this is supposed to be on a fine sunny day . Martin was the patron saint of tramps, farmers and reformed drunks - that's interesting.

Time now to be on the lookout for fieldfares and redwings as they arrive for the winter. The orchard floor is full of fallen apples waiting to be feasted upon. The grey squirrels also enjoy a soft apple. I sat on my bench by the greenhouse watching the squirrels burying acorns in the field. What next? Down came two crows from the high trees who followed the squirrels' diggings and pecked out the acorns after the squirrels spent time burying them - clever birds crows. Regular visitors to the nut feeder recently have been a nuthatch and the greater spotted woodpecker, both on the feeder at the same time.

At the end of October I saw one of the last few Red Admiral Butterflies flying outside the conservatory windows — she could see the bright coloured geraniums inside but couldn't get to them. Wasps are now looking to hibernate. I found two in the log store between the dry logs. Gloves will be needed from now on when collecting logs for the fire.

News from the Nook. A new pair of swans has taken up residence on the water. Hope they will be safe from predators. The black headed gulls are in great numbers and roost well beside the cormorants on the dead tree. The black headed gulls change their head colour to white in the summer when they go off to the coast to breed, and change back to black when they come back to winter here. Around the Nook area there has always been an abundance of jackdaws. They are known for many reasons, one of them is that they drop sticks down chimneys hoping the sticks will lodge and form a platform on which they can start building a nest in the summer. That's OK, but when autumn comes and a fire is lit in the bottom of the chimney the room fills with smoke and won't go up the chimney - what a mess. From the old Newdigate Tip on a sunny day up to a dozen skylarks were rising high in the sky and singing wonderfully, they were accompanied by several meadow pipits with their familiar "pip pip" call. Good bird watching in strange times.

#### Thought for the Month

#### Remember, remember

November is traditionally the month for Remembering and there is no doubt that many will at some point be reminiscing with gratitude, particularly on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the month when the focus will be on all those who gave their lives in the service of our country in the conflicts of the World Wars and other wars since. Also at the beginning of November we have been known to hold a church service to remember those we have known and loved who have died over the past year or even many years before. It is good to set a time aside to let our memories flood into our hearts and minds and maybe to light a candle as we remember.

Sadly this year any public recognition of Remembrance Day will be very limited and it will not be like any of the events of the past but that doesn't mean we shouldn't remember and be grateful. The challenge is to find a personal and original way to remember that is meaningful and relevant. This led me to wonder what the Bible has to say about remembering.

In Genesis 9:16 God says, "Whenever the rainbow appears in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and all living creatures of every kind on the earth."

During these present times, the

creatures of every kind on the earth." rainbow has become a symbol to remind us to be thankful for and to really appreciate the work of the NHS and keyworkers. They see it as their duty to serve their country with the same courage and fortitude shown by the armed forces when they enter conflicts of war, some also paying the ultimate sacrifice.

On the next page are a number of other verses that I found on remembering that were quite thought provoking and you may like to take a few moments to meditate on each one during the days of November. Or even find some others yourself; there are plenty there and it's a good way to bring some light into a dark month.

Psalm 22:27 "All the ends of the earth will remember and turn to the LORD, and all the families of the nations will bow down before him."

Psalm 42:4 "These things I remember as I pour out my soul: how I used to go to the house of God under the protection of the Mighty One with shouts of joy and praise among the festive throng." Luke 23:42 "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." (The words of the repentant thief). Philippians 1:3 "I thank my God every time I remember you." Luke 22:19 "And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me.""

1 Corinthians 11:23-25 "The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

#### THE BELLS OF ST GILES, EXHALL

As we approach Armistice Day, 11<sup>th</sup> November, were you aware that the date has a special significance for St Giles' this year? Three of the bells were cast and installed a hundred years ago and dedicated in a special service held on Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> November 1920. I learned to ring at Exhall back in 1960 but have been living and ringing in Gloucestershire for over fifty years. However, through family and bell ringing links I have a continuing interest in the bells and bell ringers of Exhall. In recent years, since retirement, I have renewed acquaintance with a number of members of the Coventry Guild of Bell ringers and been made aware of a number of significant anniversaries with bell ringing connections. One of these brought to my attention about a year ago was the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the dedication of Exhall bells.

After conversations with my sister and Viv Hopkins, I offered to research the history of the bells, produce something for the church magazine and organise some special ringing to mark the occasion.

#### **Early Bells**

The first reference I found to bells at Exhall was at the beginning of the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Smith of Edgbaston cast, supplied and installed three bells in 1706. There was clearly an idea to add further bells in the future as these three bells were hung in a frame built for six bells.

#### 200 Years Later

There are still only three bells at Exhall but there seems to be a problem. Have they become impossible to ring? Has a bell been cracked? In 1900, the three



bells were recast, i.e. broken up, melted down and three new bells cast by James Barwell of Birmingham. The largest of these weighed around 5½ cwt. The bells were hung in the tower and then dedicated by Edmund Arbuthnott Knox, Suffrogan Bishop of Worcester and Coventry on 21<sup>st</sup> December 1900. It would appear that there is still a desire to increase the number of bells as the old frame was re-used and there was talk of adding

three heavier bells to create a ring of six with a tenor of around 10 cwt.

#### The Present Ring of Bells

The end of WW1 provided the stimulus for a project to augment the bells and create a ring of six. The three new bells would be a war memorial to the memory of the thirty-three men from the parish lost in the war. Following a structural survey of the tower, the original idea was modified. The revised plan was to add two smaller bells (trebles) and a larger one (tenor).



The three old bells would be numbers 3, 4 and 5 in the new ring. The whole project was carried out by Mears and Stainbank of the Whitechapel Foundry, London. The new tenor weighed in at 6½ cwt and the old treble bell was tuned to fit in as number 3 in the new ring. The dedication of the new bells took place on Armistice Day, 11<sup>th</sup> November 1920. Huyshe Wolcott Yeatman-Biggs, Lord Bishop of Coventry, officiated.

#### A contemporary report of the dedication service:

"The service began with the processional hymn, 'In token that thou shalt not fear'. When the choir and clergy had reached their stalls, the Vicar, Rev C Simmonds, recited prayers. The 130<sup>th</sup> psalm was sung and after the lesson the

First peal on the bells, which have been augmented to six by the addition of two trebles and a tenor as a war memorial, and dedicated by the Lord Bishop of Coventry on the above date.

names of the thirty-three heroes were read by the Vicar, the congregation standing meanwhile. The choir and clergy then proceeded to the belfry, where the Bishop dedicated the new bells. Three buglers then sounded the 'Last Post' and 'Reveille'. The bells were raised in peal by the ringers of All Saints, Allesley, and during the hymn 'O God our Help in Ages Past' the choir and clergy returned to the chancel. The Bishop delivered a short address and at the conclusion of the service 120 Grandsire Doubles was rung by G Gardner (1), H Summers (2), J White (3), F Gardner (4), J Taylor (Conductor – 5) and C Aylett (6). There was more ringing as the congregation left the church."

In the evening, presumably after a good tea, the Allesley ringers returned to the tower to ring a celebratory peal.

After discussion with Viv Hopkins, the current Tower Captain, it was thought that a repeat of the 1920 peal would be appropriate to mark the centenary of the bells. First, the Vicar retired and it was considered politic to wait for the appointment of his successor before making further plans. Several members of the Coventry Guild expressed an interest in a peal attempt.

Then just as I was about to speak to Viv again to obtain permission from the Vicar, Covid-19 struck! Churches were closed and all ringing stopped. Although some ringing is now permitted, the current rules would prevent six ringers assembling in the belfry – it is a small enclosed space and the distance between ropes is too small. There will be no repeat of 11<sup>th</sup> November 1920!

Hopefully, someone will be able to ring a single bell on 11.11.2020 to mark the occasion and to remind the people of Exhall why the three additional bells were installed.

#### **BEDWORTH BELLES WI**

The Bedworth Belles WI is making history by becoming the first ever WI to open in Bedworth. Currently they are meeting via Zoom until current government restrictions allow them to meet face to face. Their meeting date is the third Thursday of each month at 7.30pm.



When life returns to normal, they will still meet on the third Thursday of each month at 7.30pm but at the Bedworth Ex-Servicemen's Club.

The Women's Institute (WI) originally started in Canada in 1897 and has been around in England since 1915 when the first ever meeting was held in Wales in the famous Welsh village Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrngogogoch (Llanfairpwll for short). The WI was formed to revitalise rural communities and encourage women to become more involved in producing food during the First World War.

Since then our aims have broadened and we are now the largest voluntary women's organisation in the UK. We celebrated our centenary in 2015 and currently have over 200,000 members in approximately 6,000 WIs.

We play a unique role in providing women with educational opportunities and the chance to build new skills, to take part in a wide variety of activities and to campaign on issues that matter to them and their communities. Did you know it was the WI who started the Keep Britain Tidy Campaign back in 1954 and in 1986 blazed a trail by openly talking about HIV and Aids. They helped to debunk myths by producing a NFWI pamphlet.

#### **Arrangements for Remembrance Sunday 2020**

Sadly, due to Covid 19 restrictions, it will not be possible for our local community to gather at the War Memorial this year. However, we have been keen to find an alternative way to mark this special day and to commemorate those from Exhall and Ash Green who gave their lives in war. We



have decided to mark the event indoors rather than outdoors this year.

On Sunday November 8<sup>th</sup> our 10.30 am service will focus on Remembrance. This service will incorporate all the elements of remembrance we would usually observe, including the 2-minute silence at 11.00am. Wreaths will also be presented for a blessing. To maintain safe social distancing, places in the church building are limited to 20. Anyone wishing to attend the Remembrance Service in church that morning will need to book a place in line with our current Covid-secure arrangements. This can be done by phone or email by contacting the Parish Office or our Vicar using the information given below.

The occasion will also be live streamed via Facebook Live on the St Giles, Exhall Facebook Page to allow people to join in from home as well. From Sunday Nov 1<sup>st</sup> there will be two wreath rings available in the churchyard so that members of the community can add a poppy if they wish (please maintain safe social distancing on visiting the churchyard). One ring will be on the bench by the church door and the second will be in the Garden of Rest at the bottom of the church drive, near the lychgate. By Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> we hope these wreaths will be full of poppies and a valuable representation of the local community's gratitude to those who gave their lives for our freedom. They will be placed alongside the other wreaths at the war memorial after the service on Nov 8<sup>th</sup>.

So, in summary, there will be NO gathering at the War Memorial and NO procession on Remembrance Sunday. For the safety of the community as a whole, we would value your cooperation in avoiding the temptation to congregate in that area on the day itself. Please note that the usual road closures will not be in place. We look forward to marking the occasion with the honour and dignity it deserves, albeit in a very different way this year and thank you for your support. Do remember to book a place to attend the service or watch on Facebook Live and do come along during the week to add your poppy to the community wreaths.


